

CALL FOR JUDGES

The American Prize seeks additional judges to help adjudicate upcoming competitions. If you like listening and evaluating performances, you might enjoy this opportunity.

After a competition closes, selected judges will receive five to six finalist applications of recorded performances. Judges will be asked to listen, rank the candidates and write evaluations. Although there is a modest honorarium, it hardly counts as a fee, so these are essentially volunteer positions, at least for the time being.
